




A MESSAGE FROM CEO **JOEY TUCCIO**

Vanessa Leigh

Through our programs, Brandon found his manager Jon Hersh, of Housefire Management.

As a writer, Brandon has lived by the maxim that your work is "about defining yourself through yourself." And defining yourself through your work extends well past just your script. Being able to connect with the myriad of execs, and producers, throughout the creative process, is vital and can be what allows you and your work to stand out above the rest. When it comes down to it, for a studio to decide to fast track your project, they are considering "whether or not they can see working with you for a year." Bringing your positivity, voice, and work ethic is vital and something all writers need to be prepared to do.

But when it came to choosing a manager "it was really important for me to find a manager who loved my writing and had a clear strategy to start my career." Mika, who spent eleven years working as a pharmacist, was introduced to Roadmap by a writer peer. She spent her time refining her meeting skills until she finally felt she had the runway needed to "develop and habitually practice pitching myself to execs.




DIVERSITY COMPETITION WINNERS

But the work is far from over. At Roadmap, we want to continue to do our part to bring more diversity to the films and shows we consume, and for us, that starts with the writer. Since 2016 our monthly Diversity Competition has endeavored to empower diverse writers and serve as a platform for their careers to flourish and voices to reach new audiences.

Kayona Ebony Brown

Has your face ever hurt so much from smiling? That probably means you just had a conversation with Kayona Ebony Brown. Kayona won Roadmap's July Diversity Competition and has been charming execs with her pages and personality ever since. As a multi-hyphenate storyteller she focuses on female-driven drama and dramedy with existential undertones that place unusual or unexpected women at the center. "I believe good storytelling doesn't come from having answers, but from asking questions." It's that approach which inspires her stories as she brings them from a personal place and crafts them into commercially digestible material. Kayona also knows the importance of making fans. It's through this type of networking that she connected with an industry exec in a Roadmap program that led to her being hired to write a featurette for the Big Game featuring Viola Davis.





Amena Kheshtchin-Kamel

2020 proved to be an unstoppable year for writer and author Amena Kheshtchin-Kamel. In the span of one year, Amena won Roadmap's monthly Diversity Competition, got accepted to Roadmap's Top Tier program, landed literary representation with Seth Nagel Management, got hired for two writing assignments with the producer of Netflix's RATCHED, and in November signed with The Seymour

Agency for her work as an author. "I could write a novel about what Roadmap means to me, and how Roadmap has been and continues to be game-changing for my writing career."

As a first generation American, Amena grew up caught between three different cultures. Through her upbringing she quickly became an expert at navigating racial identity and ambiguity which would ultimately fuel her writing. She studied film at USC and ASU and holds a Juris Doctorate, with a certification in Science & Technology, while specializing in Intellectual Property Law.

As a writer living outside of Los Angeles, Amena recognized the challenge of getting her work in the hands of industry professionals who could help elevate her work and open the door to new opportunities. "With all the networking I've done throughout the years, even in LA, my career never had real traction... until Roadmap".

A relentless creator, Amena garnered attention throughout the Career Writer Program with her pilot CRYSTALL PALACE, which helped her land representation with veteran manager Seth Nagal. As an author her debut YA Sci-fi graphic novel OBSCURIA, as well as a manuscript about her mother's immigration story from Iran got the attention of publishers and allowed her to secure representation.

What will this year have in store for Amena? We'll have to wait and see. But if last year was any indication, the sky's the limit.



TERVIEW WITH MARCH 2020 **DIVERSITY WINNER**

LENA MURISIER

What made you want to write in the first place?

I'm from Switzerland where the film and TV industry is slowly growing, but still extremely small next to the Hollywood machine. I realized that behind my favorite shows were hundreds of scripts and thousands of hours of writing. A whole new world opened for me: I could combine my love for film and TV and my love for writing. I soon started reading books about screenwriting, read dozens of scripts, and studied Shonda Rhimes' masterclass over and over again. And eventually, I quit my job in marketing/advertising and boarded a plane to LA.

In 2018, I attended a short term directing program at the New York Film Academy to gain experience on-set. Shortly after, I applied for their screenwriting program, graduated in 2019, and signed a production deal for my TV Show, BONNIE & BONNIE. It was the first pilot I ever wrote, and I was lucky enough to have won awards and traction in such a short time. Soon after, I signed an option for TAKE US TO CHURCH, my

documentary debut on LGBTQ Affirming churches across the United States.

I know that achieving this much in less than two years is not common. For a while, I was almost ashamed of this success, as if I had to hide because it was too soon. And then I realized, maybe these are the voices we need out there also, the ones that say "it might not be common, but it is possible." Everyone has their timing; this is mine. I met my manager at Untitled Entertainment through Roadmap Writers' Top Tier program. We immediately hit it off, not just on writing, but on our vision of stories and life. My manager knows and understands why I need to tell the stories I tell, and that takes an extremely skilled manager and profound human being. It's amazing to have someone that supports you in your next steps, someone that believes in you so much that they walk in rooms vouching for you.

What genre do you prefer to write in? What draws you to that genre?

I feel like the genre I like

to write the most changes regularly. I love thrillers, especially the ones from the 80s, like The Hand that Rocks the Cradle or Sleeping with the Enemy. There's something very special about those movies, the set up was fascinating, it took its time, something that wouldn't really work today where everything is much more fast-paced. Now, I might love thrillers but when I look at what I've written so far, it's mostly dramatic comedies. I do believe that whatever the genre is, it all comes down to the characters. I spend extra time working on my characters, giving them clear personalities, goals, giving them life. It's especially important for TV. People might watch a movie for its entertaining story, but in a show, they'll come back for the characters. I find human psychology fascinating and in most of my scripts, I explore not the right or wrong, but why someone does what they do. I'm much more interested in the "why" than in the "what".

What interested you about the **Roadmap Diversity Initiative?**

I follow Roadmap Writers on social media and they have all those cool quotes and encouraging words for writers. They also have training programs that I think are brilliant and can help writers with their stories, pitches, and networking opportunities. I wanted to apply mostly because I felt like my script would hit the right target. I'm European, I speak and write in four languages, I've traveled for years looking for a place that felt like home. I now live in Los Angeles, I found my people here, a community, a sense of belonging. I wish I had access to more LGBTQ stories in my younger age, I would have understood what I'm going through, I would have avoided years of suffering and forcing myself to be someone I am not. Progress is

happening, but there is still a long way to go to normalize all types of genders and orientations. Today, too often it feels like the characters on the screen are limited to their sexual orientation, underlining that we are different, when really, we're not. We are the same. And this subject is complex. The answers cannot be found in the pages of a book. They have to be felt and lived. To me, that is what the Roadmap Diversity Initiative embodies and why I wanted to submit my script and pres-
