In exchange for offerings like milk or bananas, the BACCOO serves its master by carrying out various tasks, though it is known to be tricky and sometimes harmful if not properly appeased. It is said that the BACCOO can live in a bottle or jar, hidden away in the home of its master, who is often feared by others for their ability to use the creature to cast curses or bring misfortune. Despite the potential for great success, the BACCOO is a double-edged sword, as its demands can be overwhelming, leading to disastrous consequences for its master if it becomes displeased. This folklore is deeply rooted in the cultural tapestry of Guyana, sharing similarities with other Caribbean and South American spirit-based legends like the douen from Trinidad or the duppy from Jamaica, reflecting the region's rich supernatural beliefs.
