

La Diablesse is a figure from Caribbean folklore, particularly in Trinidad and Tobago, Saint Lucia, and Dominica. She is portrayed as a supernatural seductress who uses her beauty to lure unsuspecting men to their doom. La Diablesse is often described as wearing a long, flowing dress, sometimes white or red, and a wide-brimmed hat that hides her face. Her most sinister feature, concealed under her dress, is her cloven hoof, a telltale sign of her demonic nature. Appearing on lonely roads late at night, she preys on men by feigning distress or seeking help, captivating them with her charm. Once a man is under her spell, she leads him deep into the forest or towards dangerous terrain, using illusions to disorient him. In her presence, men often lose their sense of direction, and many are never seen again, meeting their demise at the edge of cliffs or deep within the wilderness. La Diablesse embodies the folkloric warning about the dangers of giving in to temptation and superficial beauty.
